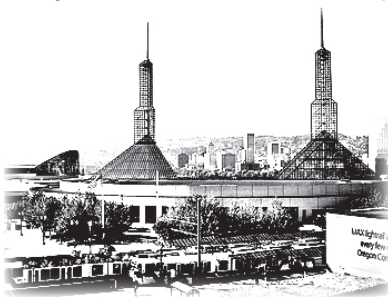

Keynote speaker: Our keynote speaker is Suzanne Best, PhD, a Portland clinical psychologist, who provides psychotherapy, forensic evaluation and consultation with extensive expertise in post-traumatic stress disorder and other trauma-related conditions. She is also a co-author of the book, *Courage After Fire: Coping Strategies for Returning Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans and Their Families*. Best will present a 10:15 to 11:45 a.m. workshop, titled "Home from War: Assisting Veterans and Their Families Cope with the Impact of War."

8:30 a.m.–10 a.m., Keynote Presentation

In the Wake of Trauma: Understanding and Addressing the Impact of War, Violence & Disaster, Suzanne Best, PhD. Exposure to trauma, whether through war, interpersonal violence, accident or disaster, can impact individuals in multiple ways.

10:15–11:45 a.m.

1-A—Impact of Trauma on Child Development and Attachment: Helping Families and Children Heal, C. Lynne Edwards, LCSW. Learn how healthy attachment develops, what it looks like and signs of attachment challenges in parent-child relationships, plus get suggestions for helping parents build healthy attachments with their children and helping children heal from the past trauma they have experienced.

1-B—Punks, Delinquents and Dropouts: The Effects of Societal Views of Youth on Social Work Practice, Marni Doerfler, MSW, and Don Schweitzer, PhD, MSW, BSW. Learn how seemingly harmless statements and common responses can actually retraumatize young clients and push them away from services meant to benefit and empower them.

1-C—Applications of Anti-Oppressive Practice, Ann Curry-Stevens, PhD, MSW. Build your skills to implement anti-oppressive practice with clients and communities.

1-D—Exploring the Use of Social Media in a Treatment Setting with Homeless Transition Youth, Juliana Scholl, BSW, MSW, LCSW, CADC III, and Jasmine Pettet. Examines current research, ethical implications and practical applications of using both social media and text messaging with clients in a treatment setting, drawn from a review of relevant research articles and clinical experience.

1-E—Home from War: Assisting Veterans and Their Families Cope with Impact of War, Suzanne Best, PhD. Considers the impact of war-time deployment on couples and families and reviews assessment and intervention tools.

1:30–4:45 p.m., Ethics Workshop

Ethical Practice: A Social Worker’s Best Defense Against Malpractice (3 CEs), Sponsored by NASW Assurance Services. Learn about the most significant malpractice risks in social work today and numerous methods of mitigating and reducing one’s risk of being sued for malpractice.

2-A—Influence of Historical, Multi-generational & Current Trauma Experiences on Healthy Child Development, Terry Ellis, LCSW, DCSW. Covers effects of trauma on healthy child development, impact of cultural values related to early attachment experience and integrated intervention related to post-traumatic growth.

2-B—Student Alliance Project: A Social Justice Model for Youth/Adult, Cathy Busha, MSW, Student Alliance Project Youth Leaders, Rebecca Shine. Get ready for lots of interaction when youth from the Student Alliance Project show you how to create meaningful youth adult partnerships to work for social change.

2-C—Transgender: Creating Awareness for Social Work Practice, Tina Payne, MSW. Gain a better understanding of and be able to identify where your roles as social work professionals may intersect with the lives of transgender individuals and in what way today’s awareness will impact that relationship.

2-D—Beyond Kubler-Ross: Advances in Understanding and Working with Grief and Loss, Catherine Beckett, LCSW. Three foundational concepts and their practical application will be discussed: The move from Kubler Ross’s stage model toward a task-based model of grieving; the cultural and gender research, which led to the identification of grieving styles; and the concept of disenfranchised grief.

3:15–4:45 p.m.

3-A—Nonviolence as a Theory of Change, Monica Beemer, MSW, and Lisa Hawash, MSW. A local grassroots, community-based organization will share its experience in navigating the challenges and successes of collaborative nonviolent and antioppressive practice with coworkers and community members.

3-B—Earthquake/Tsunami: Social Workers Preparing for the Coming Disaster, American Red Cross. As a social worker, are you ready to provide leadership in emergency preparedness, disaster risk reduction, response and recovery in your community?

3-C—You Get What You Expect: The Role of Expectations in Positive Youth Development, Patti Davis, BS, CADCI, and Jerry Fest. Understand what “high expectations” means in the sense of positive youth development and learn about specific implementation challenges from a local drug treatment center serving street dependent youth.

3-D—Integrative Healing for Traumatic Stress Recovery, Lori Daniels, PhD, LCSW. Presents the diagnosis of PTSD as related to grief/loss and emphasizes using integrative therapy (stemming from different psychological theories) as an intervention best fitting a variety of client needs.
