

NASW OREGON SUPPORTS THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON CHILDREN & YOUTH

NASW Oregon is introducing a Joint Memorial to urge the Oregon Delegation, Congress, and the Administration to convene a White House Conference on Children and Youth. From 1909 to 1970, it was held every ten years. **It has been 40 years** since America's leading child welfare advocates have been brought together in the nation's capitol to examine the current state of our children.

Fast Facts:

- In 2008, there were over 3 million reports of child abuse and neglect; 772,000 children were determined to be victims.
- 1,740 children died due to abuse/neglect in 2008.
- Each year, over 500,000 children are in foster care & approximately 125,000 are waiting to be adopted.
- In Oregon, there were 7,240 substantiated reports of abuse/neglect involving 11,090 victims in 2009.
- Each year, approximately 25,000 youth age out of the foster care system and face dire outcomes.
- Child abuse/neglect costs the U.S. an estimated \$104 billion annually.

Goals of the Conference:

A final report of the Conference will be submitted to the chief executive officers of the states & will include:

- A coherent national policy on state child welfare systems;
- Research-based best practices that can prevent child abuse/neglect;
- Recommendations to improve health outcomes and measures of well being for children; and
- Recommendations to reduce the over-representation of ethnic minorities in the child welfare system.
