From The Executive Director

A Year in the Life...

Although we're already two months into 2004, this is the first Oregon Chapter newsletter of the year. So I thought this would be a good opportunity to reflect on what we accomplished during 2003.

Political Action & Advocacy

- We held our best-attended Lobby Day ever at the State Capitol Building on April 24.
- We were active in the campaigns in favor of both revenue-raising state ballot measures, Measure 28 and Measure 30. Although neither of these measures passed, I believe we educated the public and our membership about the issues, and raised the visibility of the Chapter in doing so.
- We issued a position statement on ethical issues related to "Termination of Services Due to Budget Cuts," and distributed it to social service agencies and the media.
- We advocated with the state Department of Human Services regarding inadequate supervisory span in child welfare programs, and they addressed the issue.
- We advocated with Regence Blue Cross Blue Shield regarding its increase of copays for mental health services, and they promised that they would consider our concerns when they redesign policies for their next renewal cycle.
- We partnered with a chemical dependency consumer group, the Recovery Association Project (RAP), to advocate for transitional housing for recently-released offenders in Polk County. (Such persons had previously been told to sleep in the parking lot of the county corrections office.)
- We commented on new rules promulgated by the state Office of Mental Health and Addiction Services, which would have made it impossible for newly-trained MSWs to work for publicly-funded chemical dependency providers. OMHAS promised to change its rules, and issued interim guidelines that should help to facilitate the hiring of MSWs by such agencies.

Continuing Education

- The Events Committee organized a successful state conference on May 9, and decided to make the state conference an annual event (instead of biennial, as previously). See information elsewhere in this newsletter on the 2004 conference, to be held at the Wilsonville Holiday Inn on May 7.
- The Chapter's Events Committee also organized workshops on supervision, grantwriting, healing from depression, and risk management.

Networking & Support

- The Chapter's Private Practice Council was reactivated, and is busy working on a resource handbook for private practitioners and other initiatives to support social workers in private practice.
- The Portland-area regional representatives on the Chapter Board organized two successful networking events for social workers in the metro area. More such events are being planned for this year, with the first one scheduled for March 30 at the University of Portland as part of the Chapter's Social Work Month program. See the article on the front page of this issue for details.
- An NASW district for the Salem area is being reorganized, with a kick-off event also scheduled during Social Work Month, on March 27.
- The Lane District (Eugene area) continued to sponsor monthly lunch hour programs, with free CEU credit.
- The Rogue Valley District (Medford area) sponsored networking and continuing education events in June 2003 and January 2004.

Board Meeting Notes

Since the last issue of this newsletter, the Oregon Chapter Board of Directors met twice, on November 15, 2003, and January 17, 2004. Both meetings were held at Legacy Emanuel Hospital in Portland. Notable actions taken at the November meeting included:

- The Board conducted a work session to develop implementation strategies for the three program goals established at this year's leadership retreat:
 - Improving our connection with schools of social work
 - Improving our connection with clinical social workers
 - Improving/increasing our use of Internet technology
- The Board endorsed a Legislative Committee recommendation to place a statement in the Voters' Pamphlet in support of Measure 30.
- The Board approved expenditures to send two NASW members to Seattle to be train to provide workshops on preparation for the LCSW licensure exam. (For more information, see the article elsewhere in this issue titled, "Licensure Test Preparation Course Available.")
- The Board voted to send a letter of concern to Regence Blue Cross Blue Shield regarding a recent increase in copay requirements for mental health services.

Actions taken at the January meeting included:

- The Board accepted the resignation of Vince Morrison as Chapter President. Vince had been on a leave of absence since last July. Acting President Lisa Bates has taken over the position of Chapter President.
- A committee was assigned to develop a survey of Oregon Chapter members on their interests and priorities.
- The Board accepted the annual audit of Chapter finances prepared by Rob Rambo, CPA.
- The Board approved a one-year renewal of the Chapter's lobby contract with Maura Roche.
- The Board conducted its annual review of the Chapter's electoral regions, as required by our bylaws. Based on this review, the Board decided to eliminate one Regional Representative position each in Regions 1 and 2 (the Portland area and northwest Oregon). This will leave each of these regions with three Regional Representatives on the Board. Membership data indicated that these regions had previously been slightly over-represented.

The next Board meeting is scheduled for March 20 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., MOB East, Legacy Emanuel Hospital, 2801 N. Gantenbein, Portland, OR.

SWPAC Gears Up for Primary Election

Endorses Member Chip Shields for House District 43

The Chapter's Political Action Committee (SWPAC) continues to work to elect candidates who support our social work goals and to promote political education and participation. In December I sent a fundraising letter asking for your help. SWPAC and the Chapter first want to thank all of you, our members, who responded so generously to this request. As of the last SWPAC meeting Feb. 10, over \$3000 had been raised. This will be added to our check from National PACE and is a big help in our contributing to campaigns in the coming election.

On the local level we continue to gear up for the primary and general elections. The committee heard recommendations from our lobbyist, Maura Roche, at the last meeting. We are very pleased that the new SWPAC Chair, Chip Shields, filed for the House seat in NE Portland formerly held by Debbie Kafoury, who decided not to run. Chip is a social worker, MSW and an NASW member. He kicked off his campaign Feb. 9 and has an excellent start with support and fundraising. SWPAC is very pleased to endorse Chip for this seat and contribute to his campaign.

On candidates for Congress, the National PACE endorsed and made contributions in several races: David Wu in the 1st Congressional District, Darlene Hooley in the 5th and to Senator Ron Wyden. National PACE sends checks through the Chapter office and asks Chapters to arrange meetings, if possible, with the candidates. Since I'm a constituent of hers, I was able to meet with Congresswoman Darlene Hooley Feb. 2. We talked about NASW, the Chapter and our legislative priorities. One particular item, as she's sits on the Veterans Affairs Committee, was some education that the VA has 3800 MSW employees nationally and 1200 SW interns. Also National PACE opposed the Medicare Rx bill, as did Congresswoman Hooley, and we could update her on concerns about that bill and pharmaceutical costs. It was also a chance to promote Social Work month in March. Different SWPAC members will be meeting with Congressman Wu and Senator Wyden later in February after press time for this article.

Your SWPAC continues to be active. It's a team effort and we ask for your involvement and support at whatever level your time allows as it promotes social work candidates and values in Oregon.

- The Membership Committee organized presentations on NASW to both Portland State and University of Portland social work students at the start of the current school year. The committee also organized a series of lunch hour “Conversations with a Social Worker” at PSU, which provided an opportunity for MSW students to meet with Oregon social workers practicing in a variety of settings.
- The Chapter was a co-sponsor of the post-event party at the PSU Graduate School of Social Work’s 40th Anniversary Celebration on November 7.
- The Chapter advocated with the national Board of NASW to provide for reduced dues for members who are experiencing economic hardship. The national Board turned down our proposals, but we are continuing work on a proposed amendment to the national bylaws, which would be considered by next year’s Delegate Assembly.

The Region 5 Representative position (most of Oregon east of the Cascades) is currently vacant, so there are Regional Representative positions available in every part of the state. The Student Representative positions must be filled by social work students attending a CSWE accredited program, or a program that is a candidate for CSWE accreditation. That means that students at the MSW program at Portland State *and* at the Bachelor’s program at the University of Portland are eligible to run for these positions, if they belong to NASW.

It's Time to Nominate for Social Work Awards

Oregon NASW asks members each year to make nominations for **Social Worker of the Year**, **Citizen of the Year**, **Helen Catlin Award**, and the **Paul Star Memorial Award**, which are given to recognize outstanding contributions to the profession and to the community.

Nominees should have demonstrated involvement in activities consistent with the goals of NASW, leadership in the human services, willingness to take risks and to enlist public support for improved social services, evidence of personal

integrity, a capacity to increase public knowledge in their area of expertise, and personal representation of the ideals embodied in the NASW Code of Ethics. The **Social Worker of the Year** must be an NASW member. **Citizen of the Year** is a non-member. The **Helen Catlin Award** goes to a volunteer in community service who demonstrates a variety of efforts for social change and the betterment of society. The **Paul Star Memorial Award** goes to a social worker who has made a special contribution to the fight against AIDS.
